If you want to attend Mass with a small group, you might consider coming on a weekday instead of on Sunday.

If you do come to St. Xavier church for any Mass please observe the following regulations:

#### --wear a face mask to church

--keep a six-foot distance from others at all times

--sit only in pews that are not blocked off by white ribbon

--receive Holy Communion in the hand --do not touch others at the Our Father or Peace Greeting

Obviously new rules can feel a bit burdensome to us, but our goal is to keep ourselves and others as safe as possible during this pandemic. Consider these rules a small sacrifice you are making out of love for yourself and your neighbors.

#### THE KINGDOM OF GOD

Taking a break from the agrarian symbols of seed, weed, plants and yeast Jesus takes up other symbols like treasure hidden under the earth in order to explain the invisible reality of the Kingdom of God. Precisely because the Kingdom of God is a spiritual reality hidden from sight, Jesus needs to explain it through symbolisms.

When Jesus says that the Kingdom of God is like a treasure hidden in a field which a man finds and sells everything he has to procure it, we are given to understand that the Kingdom of God is more valuable than anything else. Very similar is the example of the merchant who is after a fine pearl. The merchant searches and finds it. Unless we search we also will not find it. When Jesus says that the Kingdom of God is like a net that catches fish both good and bad, and the bad fish are thrown away, the message that Jesus intends to convey becomes crystal clear. The bad will not find a place in the Kingdom of God. What do we do to find acceptance in the Kingdom of God?

The parables of the hidden treasure and of the pearl of great value express the wholehearted commitment demanded by the Kingdom of heaven, which is of overwhelming value. The first parable speaks of the hidden treasure which is of such exceeding value that the one who finds it sells all his possessions to buy it. This manifests single-minded focus on the overpowering value of the Kingdom for which one would part with all else. The sister Parable of the Pearl has a similar message. While the merchant does not find it accidentally as he has been in search of fine pearls, when he does find the exquisite pearl, he recognizes its overriding value. To acquire it he gladly sells all his possessions. The Kingdom of God is of such compelling value and Jesus makes it accessible to the disciples.

The Parable of the Dragnet assures the disciples that there will be a final separation of the evil from the righteous. Thus, the Kingdom of heaven is like a net dragged beneath the surface; it inevitably gathers an assortment of catch, a mixture of both good and bad. Just as the good and the bad fish are sorted out after the net is brought ashore, so at the end of the age angels will sort out the evil from the just.
