### **Render Unto God**

As the scripture goes. Christians are to be in the world, but not of it. While we have always tried to be solid citizens in our nations, Christians have also tended to live in an uneasy relationship with governing bodies. Whether Democratic, Republican, or Monarchic, ruling structures in themselves are not bad, but where there is power, there is always the potential for that power's abuse. In a very real way, faithful Christians, discerning between the way that power is used vs. the good that the Gospel requires, have stood as a collective conscience. We strive to participate fully in our national community, but we are always mindful that our informed consciences must act as a spiritual check against the potential abuses inherent in any system. We might all be American, but each one's soul is their own.

As citizens of the United States, these days more than ever, we feel the strain of living in accord with what is good and true, in the deepest meaning of those words. Over the last several decades, we have grown in recognizing both the immense goods that have been accomplished in our nation's history, while also recognizing the horrific injustices perpetrated in our society. We might often feel in one moment exceptional pride in who we have tried to be, and in another moment utter desolation at the ways we have failed. It is possible to feel both of these things and know that the perceptions are rooted in reality. Truly, this is part of our shared human history. We celebrate the good, we repent of evil, and hope to grow as a people.

There is a danger, however, that is more prevalent now than perhaps at any time in recent memory: the politicization of our religious beliefs. In various circles, we might hear that it is impossible for a Christian to belong to one party or another. Many go so far as to insist that members of the "other" party are, in fact, perpetrating evil by merely casting a vote, and that there is no way a person of good faith could dare to support "this" or "that" candidate. In some cases, codes of silence become the conditions of an uneasy truce between kin, because the alternative of severing ties is too terrifying to even consider. In other cases, rage and violence have taken the space of dialogue and communal discernment. All of this happens because we, as Christians, have forgotten some simple truths: political parties are not faith-based communities, and salvation does not come from the government.

"We must give to God what is God's, and give to Caesar what is Caesar's", to paraphrase Jesus's response to the Pharisees. The Pharisees recognized that the requirement to pay tax to Caesar out of the temple tax was a profanation because that money was intended to support the work of God. To ask Jesus if they should pay the tax placed him in the position of either denying the truth of religion or supporting outright opposition to Roman rule.

The punishment for either of these choices was death. There was no easy way for Jesus to respond to their question. Yet, with a single phrase, lesus calls us to fidelity to God, even as we participate in a world that is less than perfect. This words still resonate today. We are Christian; Christ is our ruler; living God's law is our mission.

To be a Catholic in the current era places us at odds with the dominant culture. Truly, insofar as parties legislate our participation in ways that directly and indirectly assault human autonomy, freedom, and the culture of life, we are caught like people in the time of Christ, between a rock and a hard place. The thing is, our Creed is not a political ideal. We profess belief in Christ. We name a God who loves us and desires that we love others in return. no matter what the cost. And this is the true tax we must pay, to always praise, reverence, and serve God, and to love one another as ourselves.

It is no one's business how you vote this coming November. What is everyone's business, however, is the love and care with which you treat others as you engage in the process. Hold fast to your beliefs and do not violate your conscience, but let compassion be your guide as you consider the struggle of your neighbor. Engage in dialogue if that is your call, but please be mindful that your judgement is not equal in standing as God's. Whatever you choose, render unto God what you know in your heart to be truly of Love. Grace, and Christ's way of life. Whatever the result, at last, give yourself to praying for the salvation of us all. Because no matter what happens in these coming months, it is going to be a bumpy ride. We need all the prayers we can get.
