



The Pen, The Sword, and the Tongue

The phrase, "The pen is mightier than the sword," was written by novelist and playwright Edward Bulwer -Lytton in 1839, in his historical play "Cardinal Richelieu." Richelieu, chief minister to King Louis XIII, uncovers a plot to kill him, but as a priest he is unable to take up arms against his enemies. Many of us are familiar with this phrase which has come to mean using the written word to spread ideas is a more effective method than protests and violence. Today, one would argue that social media platforms are more powerful than the written word, though they employ elements of the former.

On this Eighth Sunday in Ordinary Time, the stage is being set for the season of Lent. Though we groan at the thought of having to be self-disciplined not to eat meat on Friday (maybe the increase in plant based "meat" will provide more options), we tend to have an attraction to this season of heightened opportunities for prayer and devotions. Lent is like going to the optometrist for the annual eyesight checkup. As the lenses are rotated before us, the view becomes sharper, more in focus. Seeing ourselves and the world more defined allows us to make some changes—and change is what Lent is all about.

Change can be exciting or frightening. Change for the good, especially the common good, is always exciting because it advances the human condition and brings it more in line with God's will. To bring about change we often utilize tools. The pen is a good way to advocate for change. Written articles, editorials, documents of the Church, even the words contained in blogs, podcasts, and the like are valuable ways to raise awareness of injustices and work to correct them. No one would encourage a return to use of the "sword," but that term can become a metaphor to become a defender of the faith, of the revealed truth through Jesus, and of championing those pushed to the margins of society.

The wisdom literature of Sirach and the evangelist Luke both caution us to be careful of another mighty weapon, the human tongue. Words, once spoken, cannot be taken back. Many of the mighty have fallen because they spoke aloud that which was harbored in their heart. Perhaps as we stand on the threshold of a new Lenten season, we could focus on the words we speak, the words that have their genesis in our hearts, and that form our minds and attitudes. Our words can have painful and devastating results. Spoken words do not require the ability to read, they require no electronic device or internet subscription, they are powerful all on their own. Words can produce good fruit or rotten. Jesus reminds us, "For from the fullness of the heart the mouth speaks." This Lent may be all our hearts be changed and filled with the love that is Our Lord's desire.

LENTEN REMINDERS - FAST AND ABSTINENCE

Ash Wednesday, March 2, and Good Friday, April 15, are days of abstinence from meat and also days of fast, that is, limited to a single full meal. The other Fridays of Lent are days of abstinence from meat. The law of abstinence binds all Catholics 14 years and older. The law of fasting binds all Catholics from their 18th birthday until their 59th birthday.

St. Xavier Lenten Retreat Series

St. Xavier Church will offer a Lenten Retreat opportunity for busy adults starting the first week of Lent (the week of Feb. 27). The retreat will be comprised of six sessions - once a week during Lent at various time offerings.
