

Let the One Among You Without Sin...

One can only imagine the humiliation of the young woman caught in an act of indiscretion and being dragged through the street and ultimately thrown at the feet of Our Lord. It is another vivid scene painted for us in John's gospel. We can get caught up in the sin this woman is accused of committing and we can join our morality with the crowd who seeks judgment and justice. Is this just another story of the religious leadership of the time trying to trap Jesus? Is the sin worthy of such public display? What about her partner? Isn't there some culpability for him? Is it a demonstration of Jesus' compassion or is it much more?

We may be hard pressed to place ourselves in the culture and social and religious mores of the time, but the act this woman is alleged to have committed strikes to the very core of our humanity. Her transgression is not unique. The religious governing body already had laws about what to do to such women—they were to be stoned, and further publicly humiliated. Jesus of course upholds the virtue and dignity of the human body and condemns the action. But Jesus does not condemn the person! His words, "Let the one among you without sin cast the first stone," WAS the judgement for which they were asking. Only it was levied against her accusers. Some maintain that they all had time to do an examination of conscience and as they realized there was something than transgressed the Law, they turned away. Perhaps, they were hypocrites who had all engaged in the same activity this woman was accused of doing and Jesus words were not just a lofty reminder to be righteous, but an outright sentence levied on those who presumed themselves innocent. What lay on the ground before them was not just an unfortunate woman, but the sin they all knew, and knew too well.

We have all sinned. Maybe not as depicted in this gospel story, but we have sinned. Jesus knows that. He does not condemn the sinner to pain, humiliation, or even death by stoning. He does call us to own up to it, to recognize our sins, and not try to pawn them off on someone else.

If nothing else, most of us are guilty of making rash judgements and of piling on when a crowd forms. We can quickly become convinced that someone is at fault simply because we were told they were, or because they are different from us, or because the circumstantial evidence has convinced us they are quilty. Fortunately, Jesus is an advocate who does not buy into that sort of judgement. When have we acted or spoken words that caused harm to another without any real cause? When have we been judged incorrectly with no one to defend us? Perhaps an examination of conscience is in order, and maybe we could do it before Jesus does it for us.
