The Original Labor Day

The Labor Day holiday signals...the unofficial end of the summer season. Vacations are over and students have returned to their various campuses. As we settle into the



routine of work we look forward to this last three-day weekend of the year. It is Labor Day, and we owe this holiday to the men, women and children who labored 12-hour days usually in unsanitary conditions, with little to no concern for their needs.

The time is the late 1800s and the Industrial Revolution was sweeping Europe and the United States. Factories replaced fields and the country grew and developed an insatiable appetite for goods. Railroads were king. Hardly any products reached their end user without traveling on a railroad. People too were moving from place-to-place, town-to-town to find a better job or to seek out new opportunities to live. The Pullman Palace Railroad Car Company had the first major strike in the country. Workers left their jobs in demand of shorter hours and better working conditions. Police were called in to settle the strike which left a dozen workers dead. Labor had struck a blow to the American business structure. On September 5, 1882, over 10,000 workers left their jobs and marched on Washington D.C. It was the first Labor Day. Twelve years later Congress established the first Monday in September as a national holiday dedicated to the worker whose talents built the country and in whom all people benefit.

However, for the Christian, Labor Day extends much further back. "By the seventh day God had finished the work he had been doing; so, on the seventh day he rested from all his work. Then God blessed the seventh day and made it holy, because on it he rested from all the work of creating what he had done." (Genesis 2:2-3) It seems God has a "Labor Day" in mind from the very beginning. The calendar has changed over the years moving from 10 months to 12. The first day of the week has moved from Sunday to Monday. But the markings of the Bible have left their stamp. There are seven days in a week. There could just as easily be ten or some other arbitrary number. Holding to the Biblical account though, we find value in having seven days with the end being Sunday—the day of rest. God made that day holy, a day to rest from labors. Our Christian culture has formed us to make the day hold as well, minimally by attending church services and giving thanks to God. In doing so we help keep the day holy. Shopping malls, sporting events and a host of other time-filling opportunities cloud our focus on keeping God's "Labor Day" holy. But God did not create his day of rest from labor for himself. Jesus tells us, "The Sabbath was made for man, not man for the Sabbath. (Mark 2:27) This Labor Day as we honor those workers who endured much hardship so that we could celebrate our labors, let us also remember God's plan for us every seventh day of the week.
