

"Do You Believe in the Son of Man?"

Jesus does a remarkable thing today: He gives sight to a man born blind. We might not be surprised at this, given what else we've seen Jesus do. But to those Pharisees and scribes present, it was "...unheard of that anyone ever opened the eyes of a person born blind." For to restore the sight of someone who once could see is one thing: you are merely returning them to the way they were before they lost their sight. But to give the gift of sight to someone who had never had it to begin with? That is entirely new, especially as it begins to point toward a truth that frightens those who think they already know everything about God: only God can grant sight where there was none before.

Rather than accept what they see before them, the Pharisees shut their eyes and dismiss the possibility, focusing instead on the fact that Jesus healed the man on the sabbath. They are the blind ones, blinded either by their own fear of what it would mean to believe in Jesus, or their pride by which they refused to believe they had anything to learn from this formerly-blind man about God. "You were born totally in sin, and are you trying to teach us?" they say.

We can easily fall into the same trap, the same comfortable reassurance of believing we are converted enough, catechized enough, familiar enough with God such that we can never be challenged, never see ourselves as having room to grow. I cannot count the number of times I tried to offer a different perspective on a matter of faith or Church teaching, or even tried to offer a correction, and someone says, "Oh Father, I went to a Catholic school," or I'll hear of priests not listening to what a parishioner has to say about their experience of God simply because they have no "theological training." Pride clouds the heart and blinds it: hence Jesus teaches us, "Blessed are the clean of heart, for they shall see God," (Matthew 5:8).

ST. VINCENT DE PAUL

The Cathedral/St Xavier Conference of St. Vincent de Paul is an all-volunteer organization serving the Downtown, OTR and Pendleton neighborhoods. The mission is to help solve short term emergency needs, such as rent, utility bills, furniture, beds, food, etc. for people living in those neighborhoods. On Saturday mornings, our volunteers pair up and visit the homes of neighbors in need. We then meet to decide what needs to be done to meet these needs. Often, this helps avoid an eviction or electric cut-off. We are guided by Jesus's words "What you do to the least of my brethren, you do to me". In the last quarter of 2022, we were able to help 82 families.

The conference relies entirely upon local donations to do this important work and we need your help.
