

Jesus Christ is Lord!

Have you ever prayed for a miracle? Have you known in your heart that an outcome was inevitable but you still prayed fervently for that outcome to change?

As we begin this Holy Week, it is important to remember that Jesus was fully divine, but He was also fully human. He had to have felt the thrill of acceptance as He rode triumphantly into Jerusalem, the crowds cheering for this healer, prophet and teacher. How satisfying to feel that His message had been received and understood.

But as the days of that week went on, things changed dramatically. He had to have felt the animosity of the Pharisees and heard the whispers against Him. Was He looking over His shoulder, waiting for the beginning of His end?

He found time for a final lesson for His disciples. He showed them the way of service to others by washing His brothers' feet. He found time to bless and break bread with them and asked them to remember Him in this meal. Then He went to a garden to pray. And Jesus, the very human Jesus, prayed for a miracle. "My Father, if it is possible, let this cup pass from me; yet, not as I will, but as you will." As all of us do in our lives at some point, we prepare for the worst and hope for the best, always leaving the final decision to our good and merciful God.

We all know how the story played out. But do you ever stop and reflect on the many small miracles that accompanied Jesus on His final journey? He was given the strength to endure punishment that should have killed Him long before the crucifixion. He was able to see His mother one last time along the way to Calvary. At the end, His closest friend and His mother were with Him; Mary, who promises all of us a peaceful death.

The very human Jesus endured inhumane treatment from the very people He came to save. We all are in the crowd crying out to *crucify Him*. We all bear the burden of our own sinfulness, knowing He took all of our sin on His shoulders and laid down His life to free us and give us the gift of everlasting life.

We have a lot to think about this week. We should be sorrowful and repentant, but most of all we should be grateful. Jesus Christ is Lord!

SACRED GAZE - ART INSTALLATION

A new installation in the Parish Center by artist, Holly Schapker, focuses our attention on how when we gaze intently at an image, we allow ourselves to be changed. Are images a mirror of the viewer, a reflection of the artist, or an entryway into contemplating the divine? Featuring some previously seen images, as well as new paintings on the life of St. Francis of Assisi and St. Clare, the artist allows us to examine the nature of spiritual intimacy in religious art.

ST. VINCENT DE PAUL

The Cathedral/St Xavier Conference of St. Vincent de Paul is an all-volunteer organization serving the Downtown, OTR and Pendleton neighborhoods. The mission is to help solve short term emergency needs, such as rent, utility bills, furniture, beds, food, etc. for people living in those neighborhoods. On Saturday mornings, our volunteers pair up and visit the homes of neighbors in need. We then meet to decide what needs to be done to meet these needs. Often, this helps avoid an eviction or electric cut-off. We are guided by Jesus's words "What you do to the least of my brethren, you do to me". In the last quarter of 2022, we were able to help 82 families.

The conference relies entirely upon local donations to do this important work and we need your help.
