

# Which Sin Did Jesus Despise Most?

Whenever we see the word sin, we can immediately get turned off. The very word makes us feel judged, and maybe not so much judged by God, but by others. This column is not going to be a treatise on sin, but it is going to address the sin that Scriptures record as being the one Jesus feels is more damaging than others.

We all know that Jesus spent a good portion of his ministry forgiving sin. It is one of the things that got him into most trouble with the religious leaders. "Who does he think he is that he has the power to forgive sin!?" Well, Jesus knew all too well that forgiving someone is the basis of true faith. Maybe if we forgive a family member, a co-worker, or a neighbor, their sin might remain with God. We don't know, nor do we have any control over it. But we do know that once we take the step to forgive, the barrier that leads to caring for our brothers and sisters, and the separation we created with God, will be dissolved.

Jesus welcomed the sinner. Not because he enjoyed the sinning community, but because they were forthright about their sin. Tax collectors who cheat, prostitutes who degraded themselves, servants who were unscrupulous—all these people knew they were not living as their forefathers, Abraham and Moses instructed them. However, they also did not go about pretending to be upright and holy as did the Pharisees, Sadducees, and Scribes.

Time after time, Jesus condemns these groups. Not because he wanted to change the structure and say, "Look, I'm the real religious leader." No, he condemned them because of their hypocrisy. To be hypocritical is the sin Jesus despises most.

I think we all know this. When we see our leaders or a person in authority telling us how to live but they aren't following the same path, we see a discontinuity in word and action. For followers of Jesus that simply cannot be the case. Jesus will forgive us our weaknesses and transgressions. Those are personal sins. Hypocrisy quickly becomes a social sin and that can wreak havoc on the very fabric of belief. When that happens, faith in Christ is shaken or worse, abandoned.
