A Ghost of a Chance

The modern term "ghosting" is defined as suddenly, and without warning, ending a relationship via a withdrawal of communication. The discarded person is jettisoned in an accelerated manner; today's friend becomes tomorrow's stranger.

Today's first reading from Acts indicts the followers of Jesus who exhibited a sudden change of demeanor towards Jesus in Holy Week with the mis-demeanor of "ghosting." Except their crime was felonious as Jesus went to his death as a result. Think "Crucify Him!" Yet our gospel today features Jesus in the role of "ghost buster" after being thrown under the bus, left for dead—ghosted. Our Jesus ghost busts them all as he returns from the dead with a proverbial "call waiting" blinking on their phones in a cellular way—alive and in person.

Today, with the stealth of a ghost, Jesus appears to the unsuspecting folks as he finds an opportunity to surprise his ghosters. He appears, and they are terrified. Jesus now has a ghost of a chance of succeeding, and he seizes it with the startling question: "Do you have anything to eat?" And they are all shocked. May we all be shocked this Easter season with a newfound appreciation of a man risen from the dead. His presence is haunting but not taunting with an olive branched invitation—a peace offering: "Peace be with you."

In an age of revenge and resentment, Jesus turns the tables and reproves all those who ghosted him without the revenge and resentment. Initially mistaken for a ghost, he unmasks their fears and stuns them all: Hello, it's me, not with a "Boo" as they murmur, "Who?" Jesus also has an appetite for food and for questions like "Why are you troubled?" and "Why do questions arise in your hearts?" We are commanded to look at his hands and his feet: "Touch me and see, because a ghost does not have flesh and bones as you can see I have."

Is ghosting Irreversible? No. Disobedience irreparable? No. For Scripture reveals to us in Proverbs the likes of a human yet divine reproving giver: "Like a gold earring or a gold necklace is a wise reprover to an obedient ear." Jesus, our proverbial wise reprover, proves he is not a ghost. With an obedient ear we go forth fed by his return and moved out of fright to faith. In the end, the ghosting of Jesus by friends was necessary so that "The prophets and psalms would be fulfilled. For it is written "that the Christ would suffer, and rise from the dead on the third day and that repentance for the forgiveness of sins would be preached." Jesus goes beyond preaching as he lives repentance by loving his ghosters. Through food and felicity, our Lord convinces all of us that our complicity in ghosting is exorcized with an "I am not a ghost," and we are exonerated. Let's eat.
