### Lenten Reminder: Fast & Abstinence

Ash Wednesday, March 5, and Good Friday, April 18, are days of abstinence from meat and also days of fast, that is, limited to a single full meal. The other Fridays of Lent are days of abstinence from meat. The law of abstinence binds all Catholics 14 years and older. The law of fasting binds all Catholics from their 18th birthday until their 59th birthday (canons 97, 1252).

# **\Q**: What is the purpose of incense?

# O Death, Where is Your Vic-Tree?

I have a cousin who had her photo taken in front of a tree that her family planted when she was a child. Every year she would take a photo while standing in front of the tree, and, over the years, we could see how she grew with the tree—an evolution of tree and person. But my cousin is now in the autumn of her life...and the tree? Well, it has weathered many seasons. In the fall, we know what happens to its lushness: a burst of color, and then the leaves depart, the fruit gets picked, the branches may wither, and twigs snap. It stands alone in the winter chill, in the ice storms and snow, the wind and rain buffet it. It creaks but still stands, though, waiting until spring.

I once took a photo of my mother in her last year of life in a wheelchair in front of a fiery tree aflame with oranges and browns, green and yellow leaves—bright red ones—this tree. My mom said her favorite season was fall—but, for me, fall ushers in the anniversaries of the death of many people. For me, fall can be a sad season.

But today, we get a message of HOPE, and we learn that the seasons of life and death can offer solace—that, though we die, there will be a spring—we will be re-born with God. And through all the joys and sorrows, we will know a tree by its fruit. And we learn that blindness can cause us to lose our ability to see the forest for the individual trees that make up the forests of the world. And how trees live on. Today we learn to re-evaluate the winter, to re-examine death as not a cessation of life. As St. Paul writes in our Second Reading: "When this which is corruptible clothes itself with incorruptibility, and this which is mortal clothes itself with immortality, then the word that is written shall come about: Death is swallowed up in victory. Where, O death, is your victory? Where, O death, is your sting?"

Can we trees clothe ourselves in the love of the Lord and in hope of the Resurrection, for there is beauty in the fruit. There is beauty in the growth of the tree, and there is beauty in the breakdown as fall leads to the dormancy of winter. A tree that produces good fruit finds mission, purpose, and joy in offering itself to the world just like my cousin has done with her career as a doctor. O death, where is your victory? Not here. The tree overcomes the sting of death and furthers immortality in its leaves, roots, wood, shade, and even stump. As spring beckons, may we see victory in our "identi-tree" with its potential for rebirth.

# Catholic Social Teaching #3: Rights and Responsibilities

While attending Walsh Jesuit High School, I learned part of God's plan is that every person has a fundamental right to life and to those things required for decency. We were also taught that with those rights come responsibilities—to one another, to our families, and as a society. Those responsibilities are especially clear: To help the least, the last, the lost.

All of this became very real in my first volunteer role at a group home for young adults with mental disabilities. The experience thrust me completely out of my comfort zone...and unlocked a profound joy from "love in action." I was humbled to learn that my pre-conceptions were so completely wrong. I found we were the same in many ways. I saw that those on the margins yearn for dignity and to be treated with decency—just like I do. I thought I was the one serving—in fact they were giving me so much more. And I came to appreciate the profound responsibility we have as Christians to care, protect, and serve those who cannot do so for themselves. Now, more than ever, there are opportunities for us as Christians to exert our God-given rights and responsibilities.
