Peace to the Walking Wounded

A week after the joy of Jesus' resurrection, we have Jesus astoundingly entering a meeting room in today's gospel. This no doubt elicited a few gasps from the attendees, and, to allay their fears, Jesus utters "Peace be with you." And they all rejoiced. After a second "Peace Be with you," He breathed on them with the breath of the Holy Spirit. But then Thomas enters the gospel. When he is told about the incident, he retorts: "I don't believe that it happened." He's the male version of a "Debbie Downer." (No offense to those named Debbie or Tom). Maybe Thomas could hail from Missouri, "The Show Me State," or Texas with its "Don't Mess with Texas" slogan? But we are in Ohio, the "Heart of it All"—so where's the heart here?

I believe Thomas is a walking, wounded person and hides it with a tough exterior. Perhaps Thomas has been burned by broken promises and family dysfunction? He may have found it hard to cope—possibly got a raw deal. He's a pessimist. Lost a parent? Had a falling out with friends? Struggled mightily? Maybe he got fired or laid off. He sure sounds a little road weary. And so we have our Thomas with his "I won't believe it 'til I see it with my own eyes" demeanor. And perhaps we can learn this from him: "Be careful what you wish for," since Jesus returns and finds our dear Thomas. Jesus makes a special appearance...and we have this marvelous encounter between the two of them today.

Standing before us is Jesus. He is "post-crucifixion" but still suffering doubters. Yet if we don't see God suffering throughout the Passion of our Lord then we miss the love here. God suffers, and we learn that if one loves, then one will suffer. This would be hard to doubt.

Today, Jesus instructs Thomas, and all of us, with this command: Put your hand in my wounds if you want to know who I am. Notice he resurrects WITH the wounds. I think this is a profound and important thing to always remember for the wounds are part of his identity. They do not disappear even in resurrection. Nor do ours. Jesus asks us to put in our finger, our hand, our whole body...

Apparently, the wounds are visible as we rise like Christ out of our own graves. Our wounds mark us like they mark Christ. Think you are alone in suffering? Think again. We all can relate to Thomas. Yet we have a companion in Christ—a kindred spirit. What connects us is that we all have the state of being wounded in common—and often in doubt. And then love walks in the door. Through the walls with a reassuring voice, and a salve to save us: "Peace Be with you!"
